



College Move-In Day: A College Packing List of Essentials for Your Dorm Room Plus MORE

-At Orientation:

Ask about **FERPA** forms, **DPOA** Health and Finance. Otherwise they cannot discuss anything regarding your student's finances or health. Some schools prefer you use theirs, there may be instances you'll want to hire an attorney to prepare these for you. IF the student is attending an out of state school, double check what will be needed.

Note-some schools require these forms to be notarized.

- We have found that renting books is the most inexpensive route, and you do not have to worry about selling them. Unless your student knows they will need the textbook and want to purchase it.

We always compared: The school's bookstore, Chegg.com, and Amazon before making the decision to purchase, buy used or rent.

**** Don't send anything with your student that you really care about or expect to see again.

-Consider adding their laptop, musical instruments etc., to your Homeowners policy.

-If you need to purchase a mattress, consider ordering it a month to 2 months in advance to avoid the rush.

Before you buy or pack anything, be sure to check with your school about what items are and are not allowed. Most schools have to be very careful about health and safety regulations, and rules differ from place to place. One school might not allow microwaves; another might have specific regulations about what size of refrigerators is allowed. (See more examples below).

If you're attending a college out of state, consider only packing what you need for that weather season. Packing your entire wardrobe may seem necessary, but it can be more of a hassle trying to find a place for all your items once you're in your quarters. One tip for out-of-state students that will save you money on shipping and give you more room to pack other things you'll need is buying some items when you arrive at your new home. Also consider ordering from that city's local store and have it held for Pick Up.

Consider talking to a current student about what to pack. They can tell you about the “don’t bothers” and “must-haves” for the residences at your new college residence. They may even know specifics about your building that will be a real help. Most schools have a Freshman Facebook page which can be a wealth of information and you can get questions answered fairly quickly.

Be sure to carefully complete and review your housing contract. By omitting certain information or sending it back incomplete, this could alter your living situation very dramatically. Once you arrive on campus, you could be locked into a living situation you do not care for simply because of a few errors.

Bath and Bedding

Twin XLong Mattress Encasement for Bed Bugs & Pillow encasement – throw these out at the end of the year. *******Don’t bring them home!!!!!!**

Bathrobe (Especially important if the shower is down the hall!)

Travel soap container

Dental floss

Eye drops

First Aid kit, including basic adhesive bandages, vitamins, Tylenol, Motrin, cough drops, whatever you like for an upset stomach, etc. (This will cut down on trips to the health center!)
